NC Beta Chapter Wins Most Awards at National Headquarters Greek Philanthropy Shines the Brightest

The NC Beta Chapter of Phi Delta Theta has won the most awards from its National Headquarters this past summer, which is a milestone in its 117-year history at UNC. This is an important achievement, especially when mainstream media often depicts the evils of fraternity life on the front page of every newspaper, and fraternities are often disdained by university faculty and administration throughout the United States.

If we were to add up all the charitable contributions from sorority and fraternity events just at UNC, it would come to an astonishing \$1,000,000 annually (given to groups like Habitat for Humanity, the ALS Association, the Red Cross, and others)! Why is *that* not reported in the mainstream media? Mainly because faculty and administration would like to do away with Greek organizations, as evident from the lack of sororities and fraternities at most northeastern universities. However, given recent scandals in the athletic and administrative departments at UNC, I can say that the Greek system at UNC is in very good shape.

That is why I am so proud that we have won first and second place for the Paul C. Beam Trophy for Philanthropy from National Headquarters for the past five years. In 2007, the chapter raised \$250,000 to be given to the African Village Program, which was the highest amount of money given to the charity by a fraternity in any one year, ever!

In addition, we have held the annual Eve Carson Memorial 5K Run for Education in conjunction with the Phi Beta Pi sorority to honor the slain UNC student body president. This has earned more than \$40,000 this past year and more than \$30,000 annually during the past four years for a total of over \$100,000 so far. With the Eve Carson run, the ALS cookout with the KD Sorority, and other charitable events, we at NC Beta have earned our trophies by collecting almost \$100,000 annually for charity.

I have asked the Greek office at UNC to publicize this effort in the UNC alumni publication and local newspapers to address it, but to no avail. I rest my case regarding getting any recognition from the University on the Greek charity fundraising efforts.

The following awards also were given to the chapter: Community Service Citation; Recruitment Recognition Award (over 20 per year); Outstanding Alumni Newsletter; Silver Star (overall excellence) Paul C. Beam Honorable Mention; Best Philanthropy Event of the Year, and the Lubbock Trophy (for the Chapter that has been involved in the best single-day philanthropic event of the year, for the Eve Carson Run).

NC Beta Brothers Shine in All Areas on Campus

I hope this report finds you well. My name is Chase Carbone and I am the incoming President of the North Carolina Beta Chapter of Phi Delt.

This September, we took in 20 new members. We are very proud of this new class. This freshmen class is a diverse group that includes two Morehead-Cain Scholars, two varsity athletes (golf and lacrosse), four athletes participating at the club or junior varsity level, and representation from seven different states. Furthermore, one-fourth of our new members are Phi Delt legacies.

Phi Delt continues to excel academically. In the spring of 2012, our chapter finished ninth in the Greek system in semester GPA, and held a cumulative semester GPA of 3.21. Currently this puts us in third place for the year. We also have a total of seven Morehead-Cain Scholars, three Roberson Scholars, and one Carolina Scholar.

The active members continue to be involved on campus in many ways. Our members are teaching assistants, founders of new student organizations; on varsity, club and intramural sports teams; on the Honor Council and involved in the student

government. This fall, more than 90% of our members are involved with other student groups on campus. Following are just few of many outstanding examples:

- Wilson Orr, a Robertson Scholar and a junior Phi, is this year's CEO of the Carolina Challenge, UNC's student-led venture capital competition that is run out of the Kenan-Flagler Business School and rewards the winning team with \$50,000 to help make their business idea a reality.
- This year, two brothers continue to participate in the Kenan-Flager Private Equity Fund, a student-run fund with more than \$4.4 million of committee capital under management. Only seven undergraduates from all disciplines were selected to participate in the fund.
- Hudson Vincent, one of our Morehead-Cain Scholars, has been initiated into the Order of the Golden Fleece and nominated by the UNC for the Rhodes scholarship.

On November 3rd, Phi Delt teamed up with the Pi Beta Phi sorority to host the

5th Annual Eve Carson Memorial 5K for Education. This 5K run was conceived to celebrate the outstanding leadership and community service Eve exhibited during her time at UNC-Chapel Hill. This year, members of the UNC campus community celebrated Eve's amazing life by raising money for a cause she was passionate about. Under the direction of philanthropy chair, Wilson Orr, and with the help of the rest of Phi Delt, the 2012 race was a historic success, raising \$52,000! This impressively tops last year's race, which raised \$40,905.07 (already breaking the record for most money raised by a 5k in the University's history). It is a great show of solidarity to see the effect our chapter can make as a whole in our community.

We are looking forward to an incredible year as a fraternity and will continue to be the best fraternity on campus both philanthropically and socially. As always, we hope to see you around the house whenever you are in Chapel Hill. Best wishes for a happy completion to 2012 and most importantly, go Heels!

insurance and keep up the structure and grounds of the chapter house. Therefore, the alumni of the chapter legally own the house. It files a separate 990 and is qualified 501(c) (7) Corporation, which is non-profit, but donations to this corporation are non-tax deductible by the donor.

BETA CHAPTER OF PDT, INC – A
NC Corporation qualified as a 501(c)
(3) Corporation several years ago and all
contributions to this corporation are TAX
DEDUCTIBLE for its donors. It also files a
separate 990 and any disbursements are limited
to charitable and educational purposes only.
