Second Largest Eve Carson Memorial 5K Raises \$52,000

Event Honoring Former Student Body President Benefits Local and National Philanthropies

In November 2012, our fraternity teamed up with Pi Beta Sorority and hosted the fifth annual Eve Carson Memorial 5K for Education in honor of our former student body president. The event was a tremendous success, raising more than \$52,000 to benefit the Eve Marie Carson Memorial Fund, Pi Phi Literacy

Fund and CEO4Teens founded by NC Beta alumnus, **Kenny Haisfield '12**. With 1,575 registrants, the 2012 Eve Carson 5K was the second largest 5K in UNC campus history and brought many Tar Heels together to support a worthy cause. In more than three months of planning, the brothers of Phi Delta Theta

contributed countless hours in organizing and directing the logistics of the race.

In 2011, this race raised over \$41,000, and \$32,000 in 2010. Speakers at this past event included Chancellor Holden Thorp, former Chancellor James Moeser, Student Body President Will Leimenstoll, two Eve Carson Scholarship recipients and Eve's brother Andrew Carson.

Phi Delt is the Second Largest Fraternity on Campus

Brotherhood Boasts Quality Scholars, Athletes, Legacies and More

I am happy to report that the Beta Chapter has seen historical success this past year. In the fall, we initiated 19 new members, and two new affiliates. We are very proud of this new class in Phi Delt. It's a diverse group that includes a Morehead-Cain scholar, several Robertson Scholars, two varsity athletes (golf and lacrosse), a member on the JV Basketball team and representation from seven different states. Also, three new members are Phi Delt legacies. The NC Beta Chapter has approximately 81 active members this spring, including 22 legacies, making us the second largest chapter on campus. Phi Deltas consistently excelled academically holding a cumulative semester GPA of 3.15. Currently, we have a total of eight Morehead-Cain scholars, five Robertson Scholars, and one Carolina Scholar.

The active members continue to be involved on campus in many ways. Our members are: teaching assistants; founders of new student organizations; on varsity, junior varsity, club, and intramural sports teams; on the Honor Council and involved in student government. Wilson Orr, a Robertson Scholar, is the president of the Carolina Challenge this year. This is UNC's student-led venture capital competition run by our of the Kenan-Flagler Private Equity Fund, a student-run fund with more than \$4.4 million of committed capital under management. Only seven undergraduates from all disciplines were selected to participate in the fund. In the fall, over 90% of our members from all classes were involved with our student groups on campus. Also, our chapter performed an average of just over 30 hours of community service per brother for the fall semester.

Burgess Robinson and Charlie Shaffner, have been extensively involved with the UNC chapter of Habitat for Humanity this year. Burgess planned and executed the 2^{nd} annual "Mixed Concrete" art show at TRU Deli, benefiting the

for Humanity team. The event netted profit of \$4,000 this year, topping last year's total. The team is spending their spring break in Honduras building houses for those who cannot afford to build their own. In support of this incredible cause, Phi Delt teamed up with Chi O on February 21 to host the second annual "Breakfast for Dinner," benefiting the Habitat for Humanity team's spring break trip. We sold over 300 tickets to the dinner and raised \$2,000 which, in addition to other fundraising efforts undertaken by the team earlier in the year, will help to completely pay for their trip.

In 2009, the brothers of Phi Delt were saddened to learn that past president of the Beta Foundation and NC Beta alumnus, **John Cornick '81**, had been diagnosed with Amyothrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS). He

lost his battle in May 2011. Mr. Cornick's daughter is currently a student at UNC and a member of Kappa Delta sorority. Last spring, to honor Mr. Cornick's devotion to the NC Beta chapter, and to support research for ALS, Phi Delt teamed up with Kappa Delta to host the second annual "Cookout to Knockout ALS." The third annual Cookout to Knockout ALS was held this year on Saturday, March 23 from 5-8 p.m. at the Phi Delt house.

We have had an incredible year as a fraternity and continue to be the best fraternity on campus both philanthropically and socially and we hope to continue to build on these successes in the year to come. As always, we look forward to seeing you all around the house whenever you are in Chapel Hill. Best wishes for a happy 2013 and most importantly, go Heels!


